
This week I'll introduce the lesson activities on the "Message from Mr Miller" video.

Are these pieces of music happy or sad do you think?


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Instruments

This week we are going to explore how your bows are made. Most of us now have started learning how to hold a bow, and there's a little video on how to prepare for continuing with this when we're back in school, by practicing on a pencil.

Most bows are made from 'pernumbuco' wood which is found in Brazil, but this wood has become an endangered species and a lot of bows now are made of snake wood, or even carbon fibre.

Bows have changed shape over the years, and originally looked more like archery bows. See the picture of the old bows on the left and the modern bow on the right.



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
