
Remote learning Wider Opportunities – 25th January

Rhythm



Pitch


This week we are only doing the Puddles song. I am going to show you a video of me singing it all the way through so that you can sing along with me and get to know it better. I will also show you another video where we can make a simple musical instrument and play the song on it.



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Listening to music.

This week it's children's TV theme tunes! Here are two different TV programmes, the first is Shaun the Sheep, the second is one you may not have heard of before, it's called Stingray and was first broadcast 56 years ago in 1964. Even though may have never heard it before, I think that you will really enjoy the music!



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Instruments

This week we are going to explore how string instruments make a sound. There's a short video explaining the basic ideas for you to look at too.

- When a string is vibrated, either by somebody plucking it, or by a bow moving across the string, it creates a small amount of sound. This sound alone is not very loud. In order to amplify the sound, the vibrations are passed from the string to the body of the instrument by a <u>bridge</u>.
- When the vibrations reach the body of the instrument, all of the wood vibrates at the front and at the back. This in turn vibrates all of the air inside the instrument, making the sound much louder.
- This vibrating air flows out of the F holes on the front of the instrument and the sound waves reach our ear.
